• PROS:

Courses with recognised qualifications at the end
Access to teachers and resources that weren't available at school
Interaction with people from different backgrounds

• CONS:

It costs loads

There are loads of graduates out there Too much temptation



APPRENTICESHIPS

• PROS:

They pay you!

You learn a real job

You get to understand how work works

• CONS:

They don't pay much

Some schemes aren't brilliant

What if I choose the wrong job?



EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES

PROS:

Specialist agencies will have clients in the area you're interested in.

They will be able to advise on your chosen area and help get your CV to the right people.

• CONS:

Not all agencies are careful in matching candidates to jobs, choose wisely! Some companies only deal directly with applicants.

Agencies have high numbers of applicants and may find it difficult to communicate with you, frustrating when you could be reaching out to employers directly.



CONNECTIONS

• PROS:

It's easy, family and friends can be a huge asset just because they're there

They will hopefully be honest in their view of you and your ambitions

CONS:

How much benefit is limited by how well connected your friends and family are

They may try and channel you into something they know, or wanted for themselves

WHAT NEXT?

- THINK: You know your strengths and weaknesses better than anyone; what you are good at, what interests you, what you could offer to a prospective employer? Be realistic with your goals, have a long term goal but remember there will be stepping stones to get you there.
- RESEARCH: Once you have an idea of the occupations you might be interested in do your homework. You can find out loads about job roles and employers online.
- COMMUNICATE: Speak to people who might know more about the type of job you're interested in. Remember, most people don't get much chance to talk about their work so they'll usually appreciate the interest.
- LEARN: Never stop learning, if you think you need to increase your skills and knowledge before applying for a role then do it.
- WORK: You will learn from any working environment so don't be shy of taking a part time
 job.
- PREPARE: Write your CV, put together a good cover letter, you are selling yourself! There
 are lots of career tests online that you can try.

GET GOING!

The worst thing you can do is to sit at home and mope. You have to get motivated, maybe get together with a friend so that you can help each other.

Keep busy! If you can't find a course or job immediately then try and find some volunteering roles or part time jobs.

Don't worry. Very few people know what they want to do, so try things and don't get upset if things don't work out.
